

Synopsis

Following in the footsteps of early Buddhist travellers, a monk wanders slowly through the busy streets of Marseille. Draped in a bright red robe contrasting with the colours of the town, he advances, deep in concentration, head bowed, completely absorbed and lost in the precise pace of his movement. Meeting others does not happen through discussion, nor by direct contact, but by visiting, by breathing the same air, being alive at the same moment, in the here and now.

The character appears to be the reincarnation of Xuanzang, the VIIth century Chinese monk, celebrated for his force of character and his search for the « void » that led him on a 17 year journey across Asia. With *Journey to the West* Tsaï Ming Liang signs his latest work in a series of films all shot in the manner of an editorial: the quiet pace of the monk in counterpoint to the bustle of different regions of the world. By imagining a contemporary transposition of the spirit of Xuanzang, these films illustrate, at a distance of 14 centuries, the intense beauty of such temporality stolen from rapidity, from the immediateness of life and from the folly filling the world.

A word by Tsai Ming Liang

The journey to the West is the sixth in a series of films with the title "Walker" that I consider a heaven-sent gift to my career as a filmmaker. In 2011 Lee Kang Sheng walked very slowly on the stage during my play called "Only You". His performance was so perfect that I decided to film it. His walking, so special and so slow, in all the four corners of the world recalls that of Xuanzang, the holy monk of the Tang dynasty, who traveled thousands of kilometers seeking the holy scriptures.

In the classical Chinese novel "The Journey to the West" Xuanzang frees the Monkey king from his prison at the foot of a mountain. In Marseilles, there is a rock that resembles the face of a monkey: in the bay of monkeys. Fashioned by the effects of time, Denis Lavant's face is like these rocky shapes and I am irresistibly attracted to it. That was how I started to think of Lee Kang Sheng walking on his face...

Gently following the sparkling light of late summer, across this ancient city harbor raising clouds of dust, his steps remind me of the prayer in the Diamond Sutra:

"All composed things are like a dream,
A phantom, a drop of dew, or a flash of lightning,
That is how to meditate on them,
That is how to observe them."





Tsaī Ming Liang

Born in Malaysia in 1957, Tsai Ming Liang is one of the most prominent film directors of the new cinema movement in Taiwan. In 1994, his film *Vive l'Amour* was honored with the Golden Lion award at the Venice Film Festival, and established a place for him in theworld of international film. Each of his feature films has since been selected by either the Cannes, Berlin or Venice film festivals. In 2009, the Louvre Museum invited him to make the first fictional feature film for their collection "Le Louvre s'offre aux cineastes": *Face (Visage)*, which became a benchmark for filmmakers venturing into the art world.

In 2012, the slow-walking performance by Lee Kang Sheng, originally from a stage play, was developed into the "slow walking Long March" series of short films, which includes No Form, Walker, Sleepwalk and Diamond Sutra. These short films were made in different cities and across different fields, combining cinema, performance and installation art to present an intellectual criticism of the endless pursuit of contemporary life.

Lee Kang Sheng

Lee Kang Sheng was born in Taipei in 1968. In 1991, he was discovered by Tsai Ming Liang to act in his TV drama, *The Kid*. From then on, Lee has starred in every film that Tsai has made. Although not trained as an actor, his unique presence makes his performances truly distinctive, and make him one of the most recognizable actors in Taiwanese cinema. In 2003, drawing upon his film making experience gained as an actor, he made his directorial debut with *The Missing* and won the New Currents Award at the Pusan International Film Festival and the Tiger Award at the Rotterdam International Film Festival. In 2007, he wrote, directed and starred in his second film, *Help Me Eros*, which went on to compete for the prestigious Golden Lion Award in Venice.

Denis Lavant

Denis Lavant is born in 1961 at Neuilly-sur-Seine, France. He started acting in 1982 in several movies before making his breakthrough in 1984 in *Boys Meets Girls*, the directorial debut of Leos Carax, whith those films he has been associated ever since. Acting for cinema, theater and television, Denis Lavant multiplies his role as he's doing his faces. For Harmony Korine's *Mister Lonely*, in which he portrayed Charlie Chaplin, Denis Lavant who does not speak english learned his lines phonetically. A performance he declined later playing a violent monster who speaks in a gibberish language in Leos Carx *Tokyo!*'s segment or imbodying a chameleonic actor on assignment in *Holy Motors* from the same director, entrant at the Cannes Film Festival in 2012.
