Divine Comedy

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Synopsis

Bahram is a 40-year-old filmmaker who's spent his entire career making films in Turkish-Azeri, none of which have ever been screened in Iran. His latest work, once again denied permission by the Ministry of culture, pushes him to the edge of defiance. With his sharp-tongued, Vespa-riding producer Sadaf by his side, he embarks on an underground mission to showcase his film to an Iranian audience, dodging government censors, absurd bureaucracy, and his own self-doubts.



Director's Statement

Divine Comedy is a film deeply rooted in realism, but one that uses cinematic form to heighten the absurdity of the world it portrays. The film is designed to mirror the static, suffocating Iranian bureaucracy the protagonist is trapped within, as a 40-year-old director whose entire filmography has been denied screening permission by the Ministry of culture.

The audience is forced to sit with the characters, to experience the slow grind of bureaucracy and censorship as it happens. The static compositions reflect the immobility of the system itself—one that refuses to change, that traps its citizens in a cycle of waiting, pleading, and negotiating.

The film's casting further blurs the line between fiction and reality. Bahram and Bahman Ark, real-life filmmakers who have themselves faced government censorship and systemic obstruction, play fictionalized versions of themselves. Their presence in the film is not just a casting choice—it is a meta-textual statement on the very themes of the story. They are not performing resistance; they are enacting their lived experience. Similarly, Sadaf Asgari, who plays a version of herself, brings an authenticity that is impossible to fabricate. As an actress banned from working in Iran after attending Cannes for *Terrestrial Verses*, her presence alone carries a subversive weight.

The film's humor arises not from overt comedy but from the absurdity of oppression itself. The rigid, overcomplicated processes of film censorship and state control become so illogical that they collapse under their own contradictions. The characters, rather than reacting with overt rebellion, often navigate these absurdities with a quiet, knowing wit. Their dialogue is layered with sarcasm, their reactions subtly mocking a system that takes itself too seriously. The humor here is a survival mechanism, a tool for endurance in an environment where outright defiance carries dangerous consequences.

If Terrestrial Verses revealed the cracks in the system through irony, *Divine Comedy* magnifies them into fractures. The very act of making this film is an extension of its themes—it is an assertion that truth, even when silenced, persists in the spaces between the frames, in the long pauses, in the laughter that erupts in the most unexpected places. At its core, *Divine Comedy* is a study of resistance—not just through action, but through endurance, observation, and the refusal to disappear. The absurdity of the system is its own undoing, and the film's aesthetic choices reinforce this. In the final moment, as a single dog watches, unblinking, we are reminded of the power of simply bearing witness. The audience may be scattered, the authorities may intervene, but the act of seeing—like cinema itself—endures.

Director's Biography



Ali Asgari is a writer, director, producer and prominent figure in Iranian cinema which films focus on the precarious lives of individuals living on the margins of society in his native country.

Two of his short films, *More Than Two Hours* (2013) and *The Silence* (2016), were nominated for the Short Film Palme d'Or at the Festival de Cannes. His short film *The Baby* was also featured in the short film competition at the Venice Film Festival in 2014.

In 2017, his debut feature film, *Disappearance* premiered in Orizzonti at the Venice International Film Festival and was selected at the Toronto Film Festival in Discovery section. After staging several other short films, he directed his second feature film, *Until Tomorrow*, which premiered at the 2022 Berlinale in Panorama section.

Ali's third feature film, *Terrestrial Verses*, a cross-genre film, premiered at the 2023 Cannes Film Festival in Un Certain Regard and was theatrically released in more than 10 territories across the world. *Terrestrial Verses* has drawn over 100,000 spectators in France and 26,000 in Italy.

His fourth feature film, *Higher than Acidic Clouds*, is a boundary-pushing hybrid film that has been selected for IDFA 2024. Most recently, Ali Asgari was chosen as a jury member for the Orizzonti section of the Venice Film Festival. Ali is also a member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

His latest feature film, *Divine Comedy*, will premiere at Venice Film Festival 2025 in Orizzonti section.

Bahram Ark | Lead Actor

Bahram Ark is an Iranian filmmaker, screenwriter, and actor, born in 1989 in Tabriz. Along with his twin brother, Bahman Ark, he graduated from the Iranian National Film School and has created several award-winning short and feature films that blend folklore, myth, and the surreal with contemporary social and political realities.

The Ark brothers won the Cinéfondation Second Prize at the 70th Cannes Film Festival in 2017 for their short film *Heyvan (Animal)*. As an actor,

Bahram has appeared in several internationally acclaimed films, including *Terrestrial Verses* (Un Certain Regard, Cannes 2023) and *Hit the Road* (Directors' Fortnight, Cannes 2021). Bahram acts in Ali Asgari's most recent film, *Divine Comedy* as lead actor which will have its world premiere at Venice Film Festival.



Sadaf Asgari | Lead Actress

Sadaf Asgari is an acclaimed Iranian actress who made her debut in *Disappearance* (Venice Film Festival, 2017). Renowned for her versatility and authenticity, she has appeared in internationally celebrated films including *Yalda, a Night for Forgiveness* (Berlinale, Sundance 2019), *Until Tomorrow* (Berlinale 2022), and *Terrestrial Verses* (Un Certain Regard, Cannes 2023). Winner of multiple Best Actress awards, including at Sundance and Cabourg, Asgari has built a remarkable career across Iranian and international cinema, establishing herself as one of the most

compelling voices of her generation.
