## SYNOPSIS

*Chloé is said to be a dangerous girl to herself and to others. After another fight with a girl in her school she is definitely expelled.*

*On the day Chloe leaves, after saying goodbye to her best friend, she gets into her father's car, on her way back home across the countryside...*

## NOTE OF THE FILM DIRECTOR, **BASTIEN SOLIGNAC**

Chloé is a short film I wrote and made after encounters with teenagers in several agricultural schools in Gers, with the support of the General Board for Culture in Occitanie and of the Gers Department Council . Meeting with these youngsters who have difficulties at school or fail in their studies urged me to write this story, based on what they said, so as to understand and reveal what may hide within a teenager who drops out of school.

As the educational system seems to be unable to analyze and assess the behavior of violent students, I tried to imagine what could happen when a teenager is suspended or definitively expelled from school. Chloé is a fiction based on the story of a young girl I met at those meetings. I tried to understand what was behind her anger, mostly a deep suffering coming from a family trauma. I decided then to imagine her story, to film what she might be feeling for the fifteen minutes

after she was expelled.

Chloé is an experimental short film in which I made strong choices in the staging and the filming.

To stick to reality and to make the viewer share the feelings of my character, I decided to film without cutting off the camera, in a long continuous sequence. The technical challenge of a sequence-shot was hard and risky. I had to think of the moves in the sequence-shot as well as the framing through the car-windows and reflections in the rear mirror. The scene is filmed in one sequence shot, the camera focuses on the young girl. I want to force the viewer to keep looking at Chloé, to feel her confinement, to share her situation. What the viewer sees is limited, framed, like Chloé's life in her father's car. Beyond the technical challenge, with this sequence-shot I want to give place to the threat that increases along with the story. Not cutting off allows silences to be more important than dialogues. My character lives, we feel her fears, her doubts, her distress. The whole film focuses on her, confined to this semi-static space, echoing her confinement inside the car.

Chloé has nowhere to go, no choice but to be in the car with her father.

It was risk-taking and quite a challenge for the actress Ilys Barillot who was able to take on the part of Chloé, without a cut.

It is a confined world, with the Gers countryside seen through the car-windows. The green meadows and peaceful fields contrast with the trauma experienced by Chloé. I wanted to use the metaphor of the fatherly control upon a young girl which is so strong that it prevents Chloé from even trying to escape when her father stops for petrol. That's the reason why I used the imaginary reflection of herself in the rear mirror, creating a cruel, yet real reflection of the mental confinement a family or family member can impose on their own child.



I also chose to keep the father off-camera. Without a face, without an identity, his lack of presence makes him more threatening, more oppressive. We don't know who he is nor what he intends to do. Only Chloé's look guides us and makes him exist. The viewer is in the father's seat, driving the car, in the very same place where the camera eye is, his voice coming from our seat, creating a feeling of appropriation, worry and reject. Not being seen he then becomes universal.

Grading the film was also important. With the photography director, Antoine Guibert, we tried to progressively fade the colors towards the end of the film to reflect Chloé's perception of the world and of people as it changes drastically during the car ride. Blaring light, dull colorless images, Chloé has lost all kind of optimism and is faced with a violent, absurd, sinister world from which there is no escape.
